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learn to find the happiness that is natural to you and enjoy better relationships better health more success and a longer life the peculiar thing about us humans is we spend a lot of time working to find people and things that will make us happy in fact we seem to spend the majority of our time doing this however there is no guarantee that any of this effort will work there are lots of people who have hordes of people around them and who have lots of things but have been unable to make themselves happy the truth is happiness can be had with little effort have you ever been happy for no reason at all of course you have without anything changing in life happiness just appears we see it in young children all the time in fact we expect to see it in children if you happen to ask a smiling child why he or she is so happy at best the answer may be because for an

adult this may be an unsatisfying answer but for the child it is the truth happiness exists just because as we age we seem to lose touch with happiness for no reason at all we see a world where everyone is striving for stuff striving for popularity striving striving the natural fount of happiness we once enjoyed disappears as we join them however that happiness is not gone all that happened is we lost our connection to it this book is about recovering that connection we all grow up believing that if we work hard and if we are good people we will enjoy good relationships with others good health success and a long life obviously this is not true there are a lot of rich old people who are not happy what we have what we do and the other circumstances of our lives do not provide authentic happiness instead happiness comes from inside of us and all by itself enables us to have secure relationships good health more success and longer lives so what is the secret of being happy being happy is a little like flipping a switch when it's on you are happy and when it's off you are not it's so easy how else can you explain being happy for no reason what you need to do is learn to turn it on and keep it turned on this book discusses seven practices that help you do that there is a lot of wisdom available about how to be happy most of it is thousands of years old but some is quite new the seven practices we will look at incorporate this wisdom to help you learn how to turn on happiness in your life this kind of happiness does not require changing anything in your life all you have to do is learn to turn it on

the picture on the front cover of this book depicts a young man pulling a fishnet a task of practical relevance for many centuries it is a complex task involving load transmission throughout the body intricate balance and eye head hand coordination the quest toward understanding how we perform such tasks with skill and grace often in the presence of unpredictable perturbations has a long history however despite a history of magnificent sculptures and drawings of the human body which vividly depict muscle activity and interaction until more recent times our state of knowledge of human movement was rather primitive during the past century this has changed we now have developed a considerable database regarding the composition and basic properties of muscle and nerve tissue and the basic causal relations between neural function and biomechanical movement over the last few decades we have also seen an increased appreciation of the importance of musculoskeletal biomechanics the neuromotor system must control movement within a world governed by mechanical laws we have now collected quantitative data for a wealth of human movements our capacity to understand the data we collect has been enhanced by our continually evolving modeling capabilities and by the availability of computational power what have we learned this book is designed to help synthesize our current knowledge regarding the role of muscles in human movement the study of human movement is not a mature discipline
